

YES! YOUTH ECO SOLUTIONS UPDATES

Youth Eco Solutions (YES!) just concluded its 14<sup>th</sup> season! This year 11 teams participated in the program with 5 teams in West Central Region including New London-Spicer Middle School, New London-Spicer High School, Lac qui Parle Valley, Yellow Medicine East, and Minnewaska. These teams worked on a



variety of projects including kayaking to learn about aquatic invasive species and water quality, collecting and recycling holiday lights and markers, completing the Lights! Water! Action! Energy Kits at their homes to increase energy efficiency and water conservation awareness, installing pollinator boxes to learn about the benefits of native prairie plants, and more!


During the COVID-19 pandemic, YES! had to pivot programming from in-person to virtual. We continued to support our students, coaches, and environment by hosting interactive online events including 10 educational workshops that highlighted topics surrounding climate change, water quality, green careers, and energy efficiency.

On May 19, the 2021 YES! annual Spring Judging took place via Zoom. Spring Judging is when YES! teams get a chance to show off their work by completing a final report and presenting their projects to a panel of judges. This year, Westbrook-Walnut Grove won 1<sup>st</sup> place and Mankato West and Sleepy Eye Schools tied for 2<sup>nd</sup> place.

We can't wait to see what next year brings as many teams will continue their important work and new teams will join the

## Prairie Woods Programs


Prairie Woods ELC has a new recreation opportunity, the Fat Tire Bike Program. PWELC received a grant through the Department of Natural Resources called "No Child Left Inside." Along with matching funds through donations, this grant helped



PWELC purchase a fleet of fat tire bikes to use for programs and rentals on site. In 2019, a system of off-road trails was designed and developed by a group of volunteers and staff for yearround use. These trails have been groomed and maintained throughout every season, yes, even in the snow. The bikes arrived at a critical moment for Prairie Woods as the pandemic set in. Thankfully, we have been able to offer socially distant programming and rentals because of this new acquisition allowing our organization to still deliver on our mission. The bikes are used as a rotation for school groups as well as a rental opportunity for guests of all ages.

I want to share a story from a field trip this year. During one of our school programs, a young 4th grader came up to me and told me he had never ridden a bike before. I explained that every-

one rides at their own pace and that there was no pressure. All he needed to do was get on the bike and balance and not worry about the peddles, those would come next. After a few minutes of rolling the bike along with his feet on the ground, he felt more comfortable. By the end of the rotation, he was riding a bike. A child went from feeling nervous to confident. These types of stories are common at PWELC, and I am always grateful to be part of these special moments.
